So, DCRW is continuing our partnership with sister club SNRW in getting the 6,000 Douglas County signatures we need to get this Nevada Constitutional amendment on the ballot and passed. If you are interested in helping us gather signatures, please contact me or Virginia Nisse. Lastly, please be sure you sign the petition.

In closing, I know I speak for the entire Board in thanking you for your confidence and support in passing the 2024 budget at our last meeting. Onward and upward!

What is Arbor Day?



Arbor Day—which literally translates to "tree" day from the Latin origin of the word arbor—is a holiday that celebrates the planting, upkeep, and preservation of trees. For centuries, communities spanning the globe have found various ways to honor nature and the environment. However, the appreciation of trees and forests in modern times can be largely attributed to Arbor Day. And although Arbor Day may not have the same clout as holidays like Valentine's Day or St. Patrick's Day (or even Earth Day), it has a history with strong roots that

On April 15, 1907, President Theodore Roosevelt, a supporter of the Conservation Movement,

branched out across multiple

nations.

issued an "Arbor Day Proclamation to the School Children of the United States," telling them:

"It is well that you should celebrate your Arbor Day thoughtfully, for within your lifetimes the Nation's need of trees will become serious. We of an older generation can get along with what we have, though with growing hardship; but in your full manhood and womanhood you will want what nature once so bountifully supplied and man so thoughtlessly destroyed."

It wasn't until 1970, however, that Arbor Day became recognized nationwide thanks to the efforts of President Richard Nixon. Although some states celebrate Arbor Day at different times of year to ensure that the trees are in the best environment to thrive, the national observance falls on the last Friday in April. And although Julius Morton died in 1902, well before the holiday was given a formal day of observance across the country, he is still commemorated in Washington D.C. in a statue dedicated to the "Father of Arbor Day" in the National Hall of Fame. ◆

Voter ID Ballot Initiative a "GO"

n a Carson City District Court today, Repair the Vote won a legal challenge (see below) against their Voter ID ballot initiative filed to appear on the November 2024 ballot. The challenge was led by Democratic-linked attorneys Bradley Schrager, Scott Gilles, and the Elias Law Group who claimed that the initiative was unconstitutional, contained an unfunded mandate, and a "misleading, deceptive" description.

Judge William Maddox dismissed the complaint, suggesting that "it is time for the voters in Nevada to decide on this issue of Voter ID."

The Voter ID ballot initiative amends the state constitution to require that all persons voting in person present an approved photo identification before being provided a ballot. It also requires that

voters submitting a mail-in ballot provide additional verification of their identity when completing their mail-in ballot.

The plaintiff in this case, Jennifer Fleischmann Willoughby (she, her, ella), is the Director Of Development for Make the Road Nevada, a "left-of-center community organizing

group that focuses on immigration issues and organizes protests, community services and political advocacy efforts among the immigrant community in Nevada."

After the verdict, founder of Repair the Vote, David Gibbs, told The Globe:

"We have been collecting signatures for over two months. We have about one-third of the signatures we need. Now that the judge has rendered his decision, Nevadans will be motivated to sign the petition and our hundreds of volunteers will continue to collect signatures. The question of whether or not this ballot initiative is shot down in court, is now over. We are cleared to continue collecting signatures, and we fully expect to have enough signatures to present Nevadans an initiative that will

protect the sanctity of their vote."

This was the second lawsuit filed by Elias's team related

to Repair The Vote's attempt to introduce Voter ID in Nevada. Last year, Repair the Vote failed to collect enough signatures after a judge ordered them to rewrite the initiative's description.

Marc Elias is a prolific, Democratic attorney who has filed hundreds of legal challenges to election law and also influenced changes to election procedures in a variety of states during the 2020 election by filing dozens of lawsuits and legal challenges.

During his State of the State, Republican Governor Joe Lombardo vowed to implement Voter ID either through legislation or "at the ballot box." During the

Democratic response to Governor Lombardo's State of the State, Speaker of the Assembly Steve Yeager proclaimed that any legislation related to election integrity would be "dead on arrival."


Subsequently, legislation introduced by Governor Lombardo and Republican lawmakers was ignored

by the Democratic majority despite over 70% of Nevadan's supporting Voter ID.

When The Globe asked Democratic leadership about Lombardo's Voter ID proposal, Attorney General Aaron Ford claimed that Voter ID was "unconstitutional."

Under state law, supporters must gather and submit at least 102,362 signatures by July 8, 2024 to qualify for the 2024 ballot, with at least 25,591 signatures coming from each of the state's four congressional districts. As a constitutional initiative, it would need to pass twice in subsequent elections (2024 and 2026) to take effect. ♦

Drug Use is Life Abuse (DUILA) Program, tactical bulletproof vests and helmets, a VirTra® training system, and night vision devices.

To date, DCSAC has raised over \$900,000 (with only 1.5% administrative expense) for needed equipment and education not provided in the general budget. ❖





RANKED CHOICE VOTING

CALIFORNIA-STYLE 'JUNGLE' PRIMARIES

The first prong of RCV installs 'open' or 'jungle' primaries—meaning any registered voter, regardless of party affiliation, can cast a vote for their preferred candidate—from which the top five candidates will advance to the November general election.



The second prong of RCV requires that voters list their preference of the remaining five candidates for the general election; if no candidate receives more than 50% of first-place votes, then an 'instant runoff' occurs

RANKED CHOICE VOTING COMPLICATIONS AND ERRORS

BALLOT EXHAUSTION

One of RCV's greatest deficiencies is the phenomenon of 'ballot exhaustion'— when a ballot is cast but does not count toward the end election result. This occurs when a voter overvotes, undervotes, or only ranks candidates that have already been eliminated on their ballot. Ballot exhaustion is pervasive in RCV elections; it leaves votes uncounted and voices disenfranchised. 'Exhausted' RCV ballots are discarded—inevitably leading to increased voter disenfranchisement.

DECREASED VOTER TURNOUT

Jurisdictions which have embraced RCV have experienced comparably lower voter turnout. A 2016 Cato Institute study examined voter turnout in five San Francisco elections from 1995 to 2011 and found that the "adoption of RCV exacerbated disparities in voter turnout between those who are already likely to vote and those who are not, including younger voters and those with lower levels of education."

THE CONSTITUTIONAL ISSUE

Whether or not one agrees with the merits of ranked-choice voting, it would be very unwise to enshrine such an unproven and confusing system into our state constitution. If Nevadans choose to enshrine RCV in the constitution and later find the new system to be complicated, burdensome, or otherwise undesirable, a prolonged constitutional process would be required to abolish it and return to the 'one person, one vote' status quo.

COMPLEXITY AND CONFUSION

RCV is needlessly complicated and confusing. RCV urges voters to make decisions about all the candidates on the ballot, prompting them to cast their vote for candidates they may disapprove of or know nothing about. It is likely there will be more candidates on the primary ballot than any individual can possibly research. Moreover, a lack of familiarity with RCV naturally creates more confusion for both voters and election administrators, making it more prone to tabulation error and long-delayed election results.
